To understand oneself, there is a need to answer the above question. The instinct will be to say, I am Mr/Mrs/Miss so and so, a Christian, a graduate of xyz, a pastor, an evangelist, etc; and we can go on to run our CV as if running a script or giving an answer at an interview. However, the answer may not actually address the real issue of what you should be and your true state.

It is a common African proverb says "it is the back of someone's head that we can see, someone else sees our own". I can tell you that it is only God that can reveal your real personality in the light of His word.

May the Lord open us up through the discussion in this article to examine who we ought to be and be able to make necessary adjustment as our true personality is revealed in the light of God's word.

We should also be able to set appropriate priorities in life at the end of this discussion to determine what we should be before the Lord Jesus Christ returns to take His Church with Him.

Who I ought to be?

1. A disciple

The word disciple first appears in the pages of the scriptures in Isaiah 8:16 and the Lord was actually saying there that His law and promises should be preserved by His disciples. In this regard, disciples are a group of people taught and trained to keep and observe God's ways.

In the New Testament, when the Lord Jesus was manifested, the word, disciple, became prominent

and it is used to identify anyone who has decided to follow Christ. These were men and women that left all other things to follow Christ. Their loyalty to Christ takes precedence over all other loyalties. The disciples are men and women that are devoted, loyal and obedient followers of Christ. Nothing comes before Christ in the life of the disciples. The disciples voluntarily accept Christ as master and His teachings as commands. Being a disciple is a call to total involvement in the work of Christ. Disciples are also regarded as the salt of the earth.

"In the same way, any of you who does not give up everything he has cannot be my disciple." Luke 14:33 (NIV)

"Salt is good, but if it loses its saltiness, how can it be made salty again? It is fit neither for the soil nor for the manure pile; it is thrown out. "He who has ears to hear, let him hear." Luke 14:34-35,(NIV) The life of a true disciple preserves God's counsel in the society by giving the society a righteous flavour. Why not ask yourself, "Am I a disciple of the Lord Jesus Christ? Have I allowed myself to be taught and trained to keep and observe His ways? Have I chosen to follow the Lord Jesus Christ wholeheartedly? Do I accept Christ as my Lord and master and accept His teaching as commands? Does my life radiate whom I claim to follow? Can I influence this society with a righteous flavour? Can Christ call me His disciple? Have I given myself up to follow Him?

2. A lover

"A new commandment I give unto you, that ye love one anotherby this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love for one another" (John 13:34-35)

A lover is easy to recognize; Love is a virtue that is difficult to hide. If you love someone it will show in your conduct and the way you relate with that person. It becomes an all-consuming passion to seek the good of the person you love and make the person happy always. See a man or a woman in love and you see someone whose will and action is determined by a desire to be a blessing to the person he or she loves; Ready to serve, ready to keep, ready to satisfy the interest of his or her lover.

No wonder King Solomon sang "Many waters cannot quench love; rivers cannot wash it away. If one were to give all the wealth of his house for love, it would be utterly scorned". Song 8:7(NIV)

If we are indeed disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ, we will have a depth of love for Him and for one another that cannot be quenched. There should not be fighting, strife, bitterness and all manner of things that the enemy can use to tear us apart. We will be ready to do the things that will make it obvious that we are indeed each other's lovers and followers of the Lord Jesus Christ. Remember He once showed us the extent of His love; He died for us, His friends. He said there is no greater love than this. We will walk in love as Christ did and show love to one another.

"And live a life of love, just as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God". Eph 5:2(NIV)

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We will not work ill to each other. "Love does no harm to its neighbour. Therefore love is the fulfilment of the law." Rom 13:10(NIV)

"Do not seek revenge or bear a grudge against one of your people, but love your neighbour as yourself. I am the LORD." Lev 19:18(NIV)

Why not ask yourself, Am I a lover? Do I love my brethren? Do I seek the good of my brethren? I am ready to make appropriate sacrifice for the sake of my brethren?

God will help us. We need to have love for one another, even now. As we do this we will be known as Christ's followers and we will bring glory to our God.

3. A Christian

The followers of Jesus Christ were called disciples during the days of Jesus Christ ministry here on earth. They are regarded as learners, scholars and believers in Christ's teachings.. Thereafter, these disciples were called Christians at Antioch (Act 11:26), those that had been with Christ.

Many take the name Christian and attribute it to whom it does not rightly belong, but bearing the name without the reality of the experience of being with Christ is only self deception.

The word Christian comes from the Greek word "Christianos" meaning followers of Christ. It means to actually deny oneself and follow Christ in full commitment and obedience to His instructions as we can see in Matt 4:19-20 and as the Lord stated in Matt. 16:24.

To be His followers in essence means to be imitators of the Lord Jesus, His pupil and a learner of His ways (see Matt. 10:24-25). We ought to be like the master and identify with Him in all things, even when we are called names and wrongly accused.

Christians are those who are not ashamed of Christ and are ready to bear all things for the sake of His name. Some years ago, Christians were called all manner of names 'S.U'. (Suwegbe Union – People that are morons), gba were mesin (people that are fanatics) and several other names. Quite a number of people were offended as a result of these labels and went back from following Christ. These days, it is becoming fashionable to be called Christians. Hence you need to actually understand and know who you actually believe since there is no other tests whereby your profession of being a follower of Christ can be proved.

Beloved as a result of becoming a disciple, a lover and being called a Christian, Christ should be seen in you. The life of Christ should have rubbed off on you. You and myself having become new creatures, our old life of sinning should be dealt with; we ought to be a new lump, not living in sin again.

We are to live an exemplary life (1Tim. 4:12). Our life should characterize our new relationship with Christ. In speech and in conduct, our lives should bring glory to the Lord Jesus Christ who we claim we now follow. Let your good works be seen of men (Matt.5: 16).

Can you confidently declare who you are now? You do not need to merely declare it, your life and conduct should say it all. Men and women should see God through you. Your cars, doorpost, face cap or T-shirt are not the only thing that should say it. Let your light so shine before men; you are an epistle being read daily by men.

The early Disciples of Christ did not need to proclaim to anyone who they were. Men and women identified them as those that were living the life of Christ as it was preached to them. Thus, in Antioch the people declared that the disciples are Christfollowers, "Christians".

How else can we be known as being with Christ? We need to live a life of love as we stated earlier, let us love one another. Our love will show that we belong to God. Love is of God. Anyone that loves is actually born of God (1John 4:7). Let us walk in love towards one another (Ephesians 5:2). By what we do to each other we can affirm our love for God and for one another. We will also be able to serve one another without all the rancour and fighting for supremacy and authority. Where love exists we will be able to labour for God and get results; where love of God and unity exist among brethren the Lord will commend His blessings (Psalm 133).

As Christ disciples, we will find it pleasurable to serve Him, labour for things of the kingdom, not because of the reward, but because we want to please the master who came and served and laboured tirelessly. Remember that we are even called unto a harvest, which is indeed plenteous (Matt. 9:37). I can assure you that the Lord, the master, is definitely faithful and will pay every man according to His labour and service (1Cor. 15:58, 1Cor. 9:8-10). As you labour in hope you will be partakers of your hope by being rewarded for your service; your labour is never in vain in the Lord. The Lord, who we have identified with, is expecting us to consider the way we live, and He promised to come back for us. He said our hearts should not be troubled, as we believe in Him; He has gone to prepare place for us that He will come again and receive us unto himself so that where He is, we too can be (John 14:1-3).

When He shall come, He wants us to be like Him. The scripture says in 1John 3:3 that every man that has the hope of seeing Him should purify himself, as the Lord is pure.

The Lord is emphasizing to His church today He will come at an hour when they do not know (Luke 12:37-40). Blessed are you, if the Lord will meet you ready, waiting and watching for Him.

In that case, who am I? Your answer should be that you are a disciple, a lover and a Christian (Christ follower) waiting earnestly for the master, serving Him faithfully and watching the manner of life you live so that He can find you ready at His coming.

The Lord will want you to amend your life on the basis of His word that has actually described what you ought to be. As you consider yourself, please respond to Him today by making Him your Lord and master; He will be proud to dine with you at the Feast of the Lamb (Rev. 19:8-9).

In Palestine, grapes were trampled and trodden to produce wine. If the wine was to be kept for some time a substance is added to it to give it body. Wine was stored in clay jars or wineskins. This is not peculiar to Palestine even in our hi-tech world of today the basis of the production of wine remain much the same, and of course it still has to be stored. I'm sure you will begin to wonder what this has to do with us as believers as most of us abstain from wine particularly when it is alcoholic. Today we Christians, who profess to be children of God, should also be disciples and followers of Christ. Christ is no longer here with us in the physical, hence we His followers, have become the vehicles through which He performs all His earthly activities. That is why we want to concern ourselves with the subject of wine and new wineskin.

Wine, the bible says was given to man by God (Hosea 2: 8-9) and this wine has to be kept in a wineskin. Now, what is a wineskin? A wineskin is a bag for holding and dispensing wine, made from the skin of a goat or another animal. In Bible times, wineskins are manufactured from whole animal hides. Jesus used the analogy of the wineskin to show that the Jewish legalism of the Old Testament was inflexible and out-dated. The old wineskin of Judaism could not contain the dynamic faith of Christianity. The new Christian faith is the new wine, which must be in the new wineskin. Since we are Christians, it is imperative that we become the new wineskin that carries the new wine.

Let us look at the reasons why this new wineskin is so important. Old wineskins are not called old because of age. They are old because once you use a wineskin to store wine, it cannot be used a second time again because the fermentation process would cause the old skin to burst and the wine would be lost (Mark 9:17, Mark 2:22, Luke 5:36-38). In Bible times, wineskins are manufactured from whole animal hides; in the same way at conversion, it is not a part of us that gets converted it is our whole human spirit that becomes renewed and made perfect after the image of Him that created us. It is not a partial thing; it is a complete and total change. The Bible says it is no longer I that live but Christ that lives in me, old things have passed away behold all things have become new. If that regeneration experience has taken place in you, the whole of you, "the animal hide" becomes the wineskin that stores the wine. The wine, an analogy of the newness of the life of Christ Jesus in this discourse, and the wineskin are so important. The quality of the wineskin goes a long way to determine the fate of the wine. Let us look at what Jesus has to say about this: "neither do men put new wine in old bottles the wine runneth out and the bottles perish" (Matt. 9:17)

"And no man putteth new wine in old bottles else the new wine durst burst, the bottles and the wine is spilled and the bottles marred" (Mark 2:22)

"But no man putted new wine into old bottle else the new wine will burst the bottle and the wine be spilled and the <u>bottles perish</u>" (Luke 5:37-38)

Brethren we can see the emphasis in all the Gospels "The bottles perish" (Matt. 9:17, Lk.5: 38) and "the bottles marred" (Mark 2:22); so brethren, the quality of life we live in Christ Jesus as Christians is very important. It is either we are his disciples or not. It is not possible for a spring to bring both forth hot and cold water. In the world today, we find people that claims to be Christians, they go to Church, shout Hallelujah, but they have not remove the foreskins of their heart. They profess a form of Godliness but they deny the power thereof. Sadly, but true, that is the state of some of us believers. We are white washed wall, white washed sepulchre, and old wine skins. The Bible says "the bottles perish, the bottles marred" and that is why some of us that claim to be Christians may be in for a shocker on the judgment day except we repent and become genuinely converted.

A disciple does the bidding of the master, he keeps his property and profits with it (parable of the talent); he doesn't bury it, he doesn't allow it to spill. The Bible says "if you love me you will obey my commandments", they would keep the property of the master. We will keep the wine; we will not allow it to waste or spill. If you put new wine in an old bottle, which is a heart that is not regenerated, it will perish.

What is wine? What is its use?

Wine like we said at the beginning of this discourse is from the fruit of the Vine (Matt.26: 29, Mk. 14:25, Luke 22:18). To get it the grapes are trodden and trampled. The Bible says Jesus is the True Vine and we are the branches (John. 15:1-8) and when we abide in Him we bring forth much fruit (John 15:8).

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As the fruit is trodden and trampled it becomes wine. He says when we abide in him we bear much fruits. Does the word fruit remind you of something? I hear you say converts. Yes, but we can still bear other fruits, the fruit of the spirit (Gal. 5:22). As we begin to bear fruit the wine begins to flow, the anointing of the Spirit, the One that does the extraordinary. Remember that analogy in Eph. 5:18 "be not drink with wine where in it is excess but be filled with the Spirit"

What are the uses of the wine?

1 In worship (Ex.29:40, Num. 28:7, Lev. 23:13, Num. 15:6-7)

Wine is an essential aspect of worship. When you are a new wineskin you will be filled with the spirit. This will enable you to offer an acceptable worship unto him; in spirit and in truth (John 4:20-24).

2 The wine cheers up and maketh glad the heart of man (Ps. 104:15).

Who does that better for a child of God than the comforting Holy Spirit?

"Then said Jesus to those Jews which believed on him; if ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed; and ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:31-32)

In the plan of God, there should be a progression, from believing or acceptance of Jesus as saviour to enlisting in the school of discipleship. This continuity, sadly to say, is often lacking in the commitment of the modern day believers. Whereas in the early church we read "And the number of the disciples multiplied in Jerusalem greatly" (Acts 6:7); today we are largely multiplying converts. Hence the sharp contrasts in character, values and pursuits.

Many who profess to be Christians have no semblance with Christ. We cannot be scripturally correct to call a person a Christian who is not a disciple. For the disciples were called Christians when those outside the fold could see they lived Christ's life (Act 11:26)

Who then is a disciple? A disciple is an active learner and follower of a master. A disciple of Christ hence is a man who by exercise of his volition accepts Jesus Christ as Lord not just as a saviour. He is a man who having received His offer of free gift of salvation, proceeds to learn of Him that He may become like Him in words and indeed (John 8:31). For a disciple is an extension of the life of the master. His own life is swallowed up in the life of Christ as Paul testifies: "I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me; and the life which I now live in flesh I live by the faith of the son of God, who loved me, and gave him self for me" (Gal. 2:20). Is this your testimony too?

For a disciple, there are yokes to throw OFF and destroy (yokes of afflictions and \sin – Isaiah 10:27) and there is yoke to put ON, (the yoke of oneness with Christ – Matt 10:28). What is more, there are weights to jettison (Heb. 12:2) and there is a cross to carry (Matt. 10:38).

Only the true disciple knows the master, for he often sits at His feet to learn of Him. He can say with Paul; "nevertheless I am not ashamed for I know whom I have believed" (2 Tim. 1:10). Due to this intimate fellowship with the master, true disciples can properly make Him known to others. "For they speak of what they have heard, seen with their eyes, looked upon and have handled, of the word of life" (1 John 1:1)

The disciples place premium on knowing Christ and making Him known to others at any price. And because of their uncompromising attitude in matter of the faith and morality, they stand out clearly in the society. Though they may be derided by the world as unbending, non-diplomatic, fanatical and out-of-fashion, when crisis come, they are often called upon to proffer solutions.

Moreover, only true disciples can experience the complete freedom "And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" "If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed" (John 8:32,36). While many in desperation are running helter-skelter seeking deliverance, true disciples enjoy liberty that is available in Christ life by the Spirit of God. Only he whose life has been swallowed up by the life of the master with no room for the devil can experience total freedom (Ephesians 4: 27). "For to whom ye yield yourself servants to obey, his servants ye are to whom ye obey; whether of sin unto death, or of obedience into righteousness" (Rom. 6:16). The knowledge of the truth and proper response of obedience is the primary avenue of deliverance. To the degree one's natural life is swallowed up by Christ's supernatural life, shall the man be truly free. Whatever is yielded to devil by ignorance or consent is what he occupies. Satan is only as powerful as a man allows him to be in his life.

The aforementioned explain why Jesus has commanded us to make disciples of all nations (Matt. 28:19)

Someone may then wonder why so many professing believers live a border – line life, never really knowing who they have believed and hence are robbed of the benefits of Christ life.

There are two primary reasons for this; the first is lack of presentation of whole counsel of God. The Christ many have come to know is only a great benefactor – who blesses, heals, delivers but demands no commitment or sacrifice. In our desperate bid to win converts, we often show the people only a side of the coin. Of course, we know that a coin with only one side is a fake currency. This is why the new generation Christians cannot handle either prosperity or adversity. When prosperity comes, they tend to forget God; and when adversity comes, they conclude God has forgotten them.

We should know and help others to know that Christ is either the Lord of all or not Lord at all "And that he died for all, that they which live should not henceforth live unio themselves, but unto him which died for them, and rose again" (2 Corinthians 5:15). The new birth is not an end but rather an entrance into a new family and relationship that demand for commitment and sacrifices. We should not shun to receive or declare "all the counsel of God" (Acts 20:27). That is the only way we can live a balanced life.

The second reason for the border – line existence is that becoming a disciple is full of challenges. While salvation is free for all, there is a price to pay to become a true disciple of Christ. Many have seen these challenges and retreated while others are paying the price and are thus fulfilling God's purpose for their existence and calling. It is required of a disciple to deny himself "And he said to them all, if any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me" (Luke 9:23)

To deny oneself means- to renounce all self interest, self-dependence, and self-pursuits apart from God. This is where the fat meets the fire. In self-denial, one by an act of will renounces claim over his life and loses it, as it were, to gain the life of Christ.

Nothing in life then matters anymore except what God demands. When this happens one will be able to say like Paul; "But none of these things move me, neither count I myself as dear unto myself so that I might finish my course with joy, and the ministry which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify to the gospel of the grace of God" (Acts 20:24). This is the crux of discipleship. Self-denial will deal a deathly blow to self-gratification and self-glory.

Moreover, a disciple is also required to make a bold confession of Christ – that is a public declaration of identification with the Christ. Jesus said: "Whosoever therefore shall confess me before men, him will I confess also before my father which is in heaven, but whosoever shall deny me before men, him will I also deny before my father which is in heaven" (Matt. 10:32-33). Believing in Christ is not enough; you must not be ashamed or afraid to confess His Lordship over your life in spite of whatever the consequences that may arise.

The persecution that comes from identification with Christ, in word and deed, is a badge of honour.

Jesus said: "The disciple is not above his master nor the servant above his lord, if they have called the master of the house Beelzebub how much more shall they call them of his house hold" (Matt. 10:24-25). A disciple of Christ, like Moses of the old, esteems "the reproach of Christ greater than the treasures in Egypt" (Heb. 11:26). When the early disciples were beaten and forbidden to preach in the name of Jesus, the Bible records that "they departed from the presence of the council, rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer shame for his name, and daily in the temple, and in every house, they ceased not to teach and preach Jesus Christ" (Act 5:41-42).

In the light of the foregoing, those who hold tightly to what they have including their life cannot be disciples of Christ "so likewise, whosoever he be of you that forsaketh not all that he hath, he cannot be my disciple" (Luke 14:33). What is in your hand or life today that is competing with Jesus? Let go of it and you will be filled with Christ life.

Remember also, that to be a disciple, Christ must hold a pre-eminent position in your life "*He that loveth father or mother more than me is not worthy of me; and he that loveth son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me*" Jesus said in (Matt. 10:37). There should be no rival throne in your heart. None should be permitted to countermand the command of God in your life.

As you read this magazine, you may begin to wonder how you could possibly measure up. We want you to know that Christ's grace is sufficient for you (2 Corinthians. 12:9). God Himself is our sufficiency (2 Corinthians. 3:5). God has never required of as any thing that His grace in our life cannot make possible. What we need to do is to "come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need" (Heb. 4:16).

Discipleship provides continuity, for a disciple is an extension of the life Christ. A true disciple is testimony to the world of the life transforming power that is available in Christ. There is a higher life beyond the mundane existence. Enter now into the school of discipleship for a highflying experience.

The coming of the Lord Jesus Christ has revealed to man the nature of God and the kind of God we serve, a pure and a holy God. Jesus Christ also revealed to us that we need to seek Him and worship God in spirit and in truth. The desire in the heart of the Lord Jesus was to raise many men that will seek and worship His pure and Holy Father. During His lifetime He expounded the scriptures to the disciples to establish and ensure that they are grounded (rooted) in His word that will enable them to seek and worship God after He departs. We want to discuss a few of those teachings of the Lord Jesus that will help us to be focused at seeking and

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1. Self Denial and Cross-Bearing

worshiping God in the midst of this generation:

Jesus Christ told His disciples "if any man will come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me" (Matthew 16:24)

For anyone to be come after Jesus, he must be ready to get to the place of the cross, forsake his sins, ask for the grace to sin no more and henceforth change from his way of life. He must separate himself from things he likes, separate himself from the perverse world and follow the footprints of Christ.

2. Leaving All

Anyone that will come after the master must leave all. Luke 14:33 says "Whosoever he be of you that forsaketh not all that he hath, cannot be my disciple." In Luke 18:27, the Lord Jesus Christ

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instructed the rich young ruler to sell all his goods and distribute to the poor; the man went away sorrowful. He couldn't part with the wealth. He might have been calculating the extent of his wealth and the way he got them and the pleasure he derived from the wealth he has acquired.

Peter said, "Lo, we have left all and followed thee". Have you left all? Are you still holding on to your way of life? Are there some things you cannot let go for the sake of Christ? Can you condescend in humility to follow Christ? Will you not let go of your position and height of achievement in the secular world for the purpose of following Christ? Remember He left His position in heaven and came to earth to die for you on the cross of Calvary. Consider this.

3. Steadfastness and Zealousness

Jesus Christ said to those who believed on Him: "If you continue in my words then are you my discipled indeed" (John 8:31). Our Lord Jesus was steadfas despite all the persecution and danger of deat ahead, he was firm, resolute and loyal to His Fathe throughout His lifetime. He was steadfast to the end Jesus Christ was zealous throughout his lifetime. H said my meat is to do my father's work and finish i He also said in John 5:17: "My Father worke hitherto, and I work"; He was ready to do the wo of His Father. Difficult situations and circumstance persecutions and oppositions should not make us leave Christ. Apostle Paul said in Romans 8:38: am convinced that nothing can ever separate us fre

His love; death can't, life can't. The Angels wor is and all the powers of hell itself cannot keep God's love away, our fears for today, our worries about tomorrow" (NLB).

The early Church achieved so much despite the oppositions, perils and persecutions they went through because of their zeal to serve God and please the Father. Are you ready also to serve God and go through any situation as may confirm you." Remember Jesus comments: "The harvest is unly plenty but the labourers are few". Can God count on you? Our utmost passion and desire is to please Him, serve Him and finish His work. Be steadfast doing this work, be immovable, your labour is never in vain in Him (1 Corimthians 15:58).

Do you know the intent of God for all this? "That they may be called the tree of righteousness, the planting of the Lord, that GOD might be glorified".

If you are a new wineskin, you will carry the wine, it wouldn't spill, it wouldn't waste; people will drink of it as your life spread forth the fragrance of the Lord. Introduction

Who actually can bear the title "disciple"?

Neither all who go to the church nor all who sympathize with Christ teachers, are disciples. What are the traits to look for in a disciple? Above all, are you one? Find out It is better to be sure. Can God also depend upon you to raise another disciple for Him? "To the Jews who had believed him, Jesus said: *'if you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples*" (NIV). God bless you as you go through this study.

Who is a disciple?

1. A disciple is a disciplined follower of Jesus. He is an imitator of Jesus in all ways: in deed, in love, in character. He is also a burden bearer. He follows Jesus without reservation and without repentance.

The disciple is a learner (Matt 11:29). He is an apprentice of Jesus, taking instruction from Him. (John 5:19-21). A disciple is that fellow who hears the voice of his master and does what He says all throughout his life. A disciple is one who is ready to learn from His master and His people (John 10:27).
A disciple is a tied down colt for the master's use (Mark 11:1-3, 2 Timothy 2:21).

Origin & Purpose of a Disciple

Disciples were called as they had encounter with Jesus (John 1:39-45) e.g. Andrew, Simon Peter, Philip, Nathaniel. Disciples were chosen and ordained for the following purposes: Mark 3:14-19

- That Christ might send them to preach the gospel, Mark 16:15. The gospel must be preached in season and out of season (2 Timothy 4:2, Acts 6:3-4)
- 2. To fellowship with one another, Psalm 100:2
- To pray for the sick and heal the sick (James 5:15-16), deliver the oppressed, Mark 16:17-18, and bring rest to those in distress (2 Timothy 4:5).
- 4. To work miracles, Acts 3:1-10.
- 5. To teach the word of God and doctrines of Christ.

The Goal of a Disciple

The goal of a disciple is to be like His master in all things, to live for Him and be His representative. Note the following:

- He that is perfect or fully trained shall be like His master (Luke 6:40, Matt 23:15, John 13:16, John 15:20).
- He keeps his master's words, and living them out before men, He becomes an asset to his master's cause (John 13:17, John 15:13-19, John 13:35, John 14:21-24, Romans 13:9-10).
- He reproduces himself (2 Timothy 2:2).

Qualities of a Disciple

- i. Being born again (John 3:3-6, Romans 8:7-8)
- ii. Imitation of Christ
- iii. Daily follower-ship of Jesus Christ
- iv. Faithfulness

Challenges of a Disciple

The following are the challenges of a disciple:

- He must have the discipline for regular fasting (2 Corinthians 11:27, Matt 4:1-2)
- He is a champion at praying fervently (1 Thessalonians 5:17, Romans 12:12)
- He studies and meditates in the word constantly (Joshua 1:8, 2 Timothy 2:5, Psalm 119:9-11, 105, 130, James 1:22-25)
- Witnessing and sharing his testimonies with others
- Imitating the life of Christ daily (Hebrews 12:1-2)
- He must endure in all things (2 Timothy 2:3-5, James 1:12, 1 Corinthians 10:13)

The work of the Holy Spirit in a Disciple

Our Lord Jesus Christ has promised that all the works He did, we shall do also and greater works shall we do by the Holy Spirit (John 14:12). The Apostles of old did great works and performed great wonders. By the power of the Holy Spirit, we shall perform greater work in Jesus name. In the New Testament, the Holy Spirit became resident in the life of every genuine disciple and such people did exploits for the kingdom of God. For example: Peter and John - Acts 3:1-7; Stephen - Acts 7:1-55; Philip - Acts 8:5-13.

A disciple must not joke with what the Holy Spirit is able to do. He must be filled with the Spirit all the time. For as many as are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God, Romans 8:14. For someone to remain a disciple forever, he must allow the Holy Spirit to dwell regularly in him.

The Lifestyle of a Disciple

A. Prayerfulness

Prayer is not an easy way of getting what we want **but the only way of becoming what God wants us to be" -S. Kennedy**

No person is so high in position or in grace to be exempted from the obligation to pray. No person is too big to pray, no matter who he is or what office he holds.

Why disciples (particularly) should pray?

Jesus who is our perfect example prayed - Luke 11:1, Matt. 14:21-23.

Comments of Jesus - Jesus Christ said we are the branch and not the vine; so as a result of this, disciples must pray (John 15: 5, 16). Also He said greater works than the works He did we will do, so we must pray to achieve this (John 14:12-14).

The disciples of old prayed, so we also must pray. Behind the great acts of the disciples was devotion to prayers (Acts 1:14, 4:23, 44, 31, 33; Acts 6:1-4, 7). They benefited from their prayerfulness (Acts 13:2-3, 4:32; 5:14; 6:7).

B. Holiness

Holiness separates a saint from a sinner. This will show to the people of the world that a disciple is different. Every sinner is still in the fallen state of Adam and Eve (Genesis 3: 9-10). Holiness opens the door for the disciple before God (Hebrews 12:14) and also prepares the disciple of Christ for the coming of Christ (1 Thessalonians 3:13; Matthew 22:11-14).

How to live a life of Holiness?

- 1. Continuous and constant life of obedience (Matthew 4:18-20, Matthew 19:16-24)
- 2. You must be prayerful and knowledgeable (knowledge of the word of God) (Ephesians 5:26-27; Isaiah 40:27-31)
- You must be watchful and determine to live a life of consecration (Judges 16:1-31; 2 Kings 5:20-27; 2 Kings 5:20-27). Samson and Gehazi as a case study.
- 4. You must know how to manage success (Luke 12:16-20)

Orderly and Godly lifestyle

A disciple must live an orderly and godly lifestyle that radiates the glory of God and exemplary for others to learn from. This will also be shown in whatever role or capacity the disciple finds himself or herself. We want to take the home as a case study, since we all function in the home as a husband, wife or child.

As a husband (Gen 1:26; Ephesians 5:23-25), a disciple as the head of the home must live an exemplary life; He must live by the instructions he gives and what he teaches. He is also expected to live a life that shows his faith in God. He must be able to lead his family to God and trust God to meet the needs of the home continually. He must create time for his family and provide always an atmosphere where God's love is shown to everyone. The need of everyone in the home should be taken care of. He is also expected to protect the family and exercise loving discipline to everyone in the family.

As a wife (Titus 2:4-5, Proverbs 14:1), a disciple must be a partner to keep the home. She is expected to submit to her husband. She must raise her children in a Godly way (Titus 2:14). She is expected to give sound counsel to her husband (Proverbs 31:23) and spend time in prayer for him.

As a child (Psalm 127:3), a disciple is the heritage of the Lord. He or she should be taught in the way of the Lord, corrected but not provoked. His or her needs should be provided for. As a disciple, he or she should be subject to the discipline of the parents (Proverbs 29:15). He or she should live an exemplary life despite the fact of being a youth.

D. A soaring life, like that of an eagle

A disciple must live the life that demonstrates the characteristics we can liken to that of an eagle. Let us quickly consider some characteristic of the eagle.

Eagle is a powerful bird, with an enormous strength; it flies with authority and exercise dominion in the sky. Disciples ought to live as children of God, kings and queens, exercising dominion and wielding God's authority as is supposed to be at the beginning (Genesis 1:28, 1 Peter 2:9).

Eagles do not eat carcasses. They do not eat anything that dies of itself. They eat living things. Disciples are expected to feed continually on the living word of God. The word of God is forever living.

Eagle live in the highest point available in the environment. They live on mountaintops. The life of

a disciple should be above the standards of the world. God will expect a disciple to live above sin. Sin is in the valley (Ephesians 2:1-6).

Most birds fly away screaming when a storm is imminent, but an eagle faces a storm, raises its wings, and rises up with the storm to a higher height. (See 1 Samuel 17:48-49). An eagle rides on the storm. A disciple should be ready to face challenges of life, trials of life and not run away when the going is tough. The trial of faith in the life of disciple is of value; it works patience (James 1:2-4). The Lord will strengthen in any situation.

An eagle dies at an old age. It stays on the mountaintop and faces the sun until it dies. A disciple should live long and throughout his lifetime remain focused on the King of kings, facing the Sun of righteousness (Malachi 4: 2). He should be focused on eternity and have the hope of seeing the Lord.

Are you a disciple indeed? Use this study to judge yourself and make appropriate amendment. God bless you.
